





Nestled approximately 10 kilometers off the coast of Misamis Oriental in Northern Mindanao lies the enchanting Island Province of Camiguin. This ecological treasure has captured the hearts of many, making it one of the most sought-after tourist destinations in the country. Renowned for its landscape molded by 14 majestic volcanoes, Camiguin is aptly named "The Island Born of Fire." Camiguin is a natural utopia endowed with breathtaking bodies of land and, notably, water. The pristine waters of this paradise provide a diverse ecosystem of marine life, perfect for diving, snorkeling, and underwater photography. Camiguin promises limitless island adventures and tranquil retreats that make every stay special. The Timpoong-Hibok-Hibok Natural Monument, an ASEAN heritage park, is a staple destination for trekking, bird-watching, and stargazing on a clear night. The mountain range is home to the endemic Camiguin Hawk Owl. The island also has a bounty of waterfalls and springs for tourists who love a refreshing dip.

How to get there:

By Air:

You may take daily flights between Cebu to Camiguin.

By Land:

Tourists may take short-distance rides through the island's public utility vehicle, which includes motorcycles, tricycles, or multicab. You can also rent a van, especially when traveling as a group, with rates varying between operators.

By Sea:

Tourists may take flights from Manila and Cebu bound for Cagayan de Oro-Laguindingan Airport. From Laguindingan, take the airport shuttle to Agora Bus Terminal. Hop on a 2-hour bus ride to the Port of Balingoan, where you can board a ferry bound for Camiguin Island, which travels around 1.5 to 2 hours. Ferries dock at the Port of Benoni in the Municipality of Mahinog, about 17 kilometers south of the capital town of Mambajao.

Camiguin's Top Destinations



White Island

Mambaja Camiguir

The White Island is a must-visit when in Camiguin. This sandbar is an island of white sand, crushed corals, and pebble stones, making this part of Camiguin Province ideal for snorkeling or sunbathing. Also famous for its dive spots, it boasts a black coral underwater forest. The White Island is widely known for its picturesque spots, with Camiguin Island in the background. Photo shoots are best done in the early morning or before sunset. The island's shape changes daily, depending on the tides.



Tuasan Falls

Hidden within a lush forest at the foot of Mount Tres Marias in Catarman, Tuasan Falls is a destination straight out of a fairy tale. This tourism gem is a staple when touring the Island Province of Camiguin. Tourists have been coming back, lured by the secluded beauty of its forceful cascading waters and surrounded by its captivating flora and fauna.



Mantigue Island

Mahinog

Mantigue Island, a tropical paradise spanning four hectares, boasts a captivating mini-forest at its heart. A quick 15- to 20-minute outrigger boat ride from the main island of Camiguin transports you to this idyllic attraction. Divers will be enchanted by the island's underwater wonders, with a vibrant array of rare and colorful marine life, including the endangered Hawksbill turtle, nudibranchs, frogfish, sharks, and bustling schools of fish, all set against the stunning coral gardens and seascapes.



Sunken Cemetery

Catarma Camiguit

Take a peek under the waters and discover what remains of an old cemetery sunk by the eruption of Mt. Vulcan in 1871. Transformed into a pristine sanctuary below the waves, a giant cross is erected as the landmark of this mysterious historical site. Part of the beautiful seascape of this famous dive site is an array of six different species of giant clams. If diving is not for you, you can pose on the view deck or take a boat to the cross base to take unforgettable photos of your experience.

Mt. Hibok-Hibok

Mambajao, Camiguin

The second smallest province in the Philippines is blessed with natural wonders. Known for its dramatic history and stunning views from its summit, Mt. Hibok-Hibok, an active volcano, together with Mt. Timpoong was declared an ASEAN Heritage Park in 2015. This protected landscape is home to a wide range of diverse and endemic flora and fauna, making it a premier ecotourism site in Camiguin. It is also recognized for its importance in shaping the country's overall biodiversity.



Sto. Niño Cold Spring

Take a dip at Sto. Niño Cold Spring, where the fresh spring water from the mountains flows into two pools. Swim in the large pool with cool mineral spring water, surrounded by natural scenery. Kids can enjoy a smaller, shallower pool, which also features a sandy base. Cottages are available for whole-day outlings with friends or families. A day at Sto. Niño Cold Spring is indeed the perfect way to refresh and cool off.

The 70-meter-high Katibawasan Falls is the highest falls in Camiguin. Mt. Timpoong supplies its narrow stream of water and drops vigorously into a cool, fresh water basin. The waterfall is framed by magnificent limestone walls and surrounded by thick forest, offering a secluded escape on your Camiguin island tour.
